

Suggested Summer Activities for Rising 4th Graders

Welcome to 4th Grade <u>Math</u>

Practice your Math Facts:

Practice daily to be more fluent with your addition, subtraction, multiplication and division facts. Here are some suggested websites that may help you increase your fact fluency:

Here are some other Math activities to try...

Practice your multiplication facts 2s-12s for 15 minutes.	Practice telling time on an analog clock and record in a schedule your day-to-day events.	Practice adding 3-digit numbers with re-grouping for 15 minutes.
Practice adding 3-digit numbers without re-grouping for 15 minutes.	Develop a song, or poem to help you remember how to skip count by 3s, 4s, 6s, 7s, 8s, and 9s for 15 minutes.	Design a survey and then poll at least 20 friends/family members. Display your data in a bar graph.
The answer is 54 owls. Write three different story problems to fit the answer.	Plan a budget for your dream 7-day vacation. Be sure to include costs for transportation, daily meals and accommodations (where you will sleep).	Practice subtracting 2-digit and/or 3-digit numbers with regrouping for 15 minutes.

Reading for at least 30 minutes each day will help you keep growing as a reader. Not sure what to read? Below are a couple of book lists that can help you find a best book match. Consider trying a new genre or series, or read a magazine or newspaper article. Log your reading to keep track of your progress! (Set up a Good Reads account! It's fun to keep track of your reading here and you can create your own "Want to Read" list.)

We also encourage you to talk or write about the book you are reading with your family and friends. Use these discussion questions as conversation starters or journal prompts:

- What happened in this chapter? Summarize the main events, including main characters and settings.
- What is the theme of this story? (Theme = the message; a lesson learned by a character)
- How do/does the main character(s) change throughout this story?
- What do you think about the choices the character has made? Would you do the same thing?

Writing:

Summer is great time to keep a writing journal. On a trip? At the end of each day, write about the place you visited, a funny thing that happened or an amazing site. Here are a couple of other ideas to get the creative juices flowing...

Create your own brand of cereal. Develop three main reasons someone should buy/eat this cereal with two supporting details for each reason.	4th grade is all about Florida! Research a historical event that took place in our state or a place in Florida you have not yet visited. Write a news report detailing your findings.	Write a story about your favorite childhood memory; include characters, setting, problem and solution.
Write a detailed letter to a family member using the correct format.	Compare and contrast last summer to this summer.	Write a poem about your favorite vacation spot.
What is currently your favorite song, movie, TV show, book, game? Why?	Research a topic that interests you (ex. an animal, a famous person, a vacation spot) and make a brochure to teach others what you learned.	Who is your best friend? Name one characteristic that you like about this friend, describe this quality and why you like it.
